JOIN THE OHIO FARM TO SCHOOL NETWORK

Since forming in 2011, the Ohio Farm to School Network has been led by The Ohio State University Extension. Comprised of representatives from state and local agencies, school districts, non-profit organizations, food producers, distributors, and other stakeholders within the food system, this group meets quarterly to support efforts in the procurement, serving, and teaching about local foods to children throughout Ohio. In 2020, Ohio Department of Agriculture, in partnership with Ohio Department of Education, was awarded a \$100,000 USDA State Agency F2S Grant to strengthen the existing Ohio Network. Through that process, eight regional networks were created providing a framework for coordination among Ohio F2S programs while celebrating the regional characteristics and cultures found around the state.
